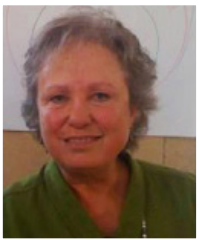

Learn from Two Founders of the Field of Equine Facilitated Learning and Psychotherapy:



Trish Broersma, MA, LMT, TRI, ESMHL

Trish established two accredited PATH Premier Accredited Centers over the past 25 years, and served as president of the Equine Facilitated Mental Association, a former section of NARHA. Her book *Riding into Your Mythic Life: Transformational Adventures with the Horse*, published in 2007 by New World Library, details her work in human development and the horse/human connection since 1980. She serves on the PATH Equine Welfare Committee and is faculty for the Equine Specialist Workshop. Currently she lives in Ashland, OR and conducts training and workshops in the US and Australia, including Riding Beyond, a program for women recovering from breast cancer treatment.



Leslie McCullough, PhD, LCSW, TRI, ESMHL

For over 35 years Leslie has conducted psychotherapy with youth, including 24 years as one of the first full time EFP programs in the country. Serving on the EFMHA board, Leslie was one of the co-creators of the ESMHL workshop, which she currently teaches throughout the US. Leslie is now an assistant professor in social work at Washburn University in Topeka, KS, and is also a consultant and trainer with Hope and Healing Academy. Leslie and her Tufts University colleague, Megan Mueller, PhD were the 2013 recipients of HHRF research funding on the effect of EFP on PTSD, results of which were presented at PATH 2015 national conference.
